Leslie Ballard

Leslie Ballard's mother was an acrylic artist specializing in animals and landscapes, so her interest in creating pieces of art came naturally. She followed in her mother's footsteps as an acrylic artist until discovering resin in 2015. Resin as a medium creates movement and shine in art pieces and each piece is totally unique. Leslie began using resin to create large, abstract wall art pieces. Some of the pieces can be seen in people's homes across the country, as well as in local businesses such as banks and wine bars.

Leslie's focus now is three-dimensional work combining resin and wood. Her family took a leap of faith and gifted her a lathe, tools and various accoutrements for Christmas one year after she made a casual comment about wanting to know how to turn a vase/bowl. She had no experience whatsoever in woodworking, but it was obviously a terrific gift as she has been an avid wood turner ever since.

Interestingly, almost everything she knows about turning she learned through YouTube videos!

The process of taking a piece of wood from its natural state to a piece of art fascinates Leslie. The wood has to be bone dry, shaped, molded with resin and then turned and finished. This multi-step process keeps her engaged and entertained! There is a thrill in discovering what the wood and resin become as they unveil themselves on the lathe. Leslie is a resident of Milton, Georgia, and can be found on the golf course when she's not on her lathe.

The Process

The wood must be dry, completely dry. Wood takes a year to dry per inch of thickness. The process can be accelerated by heating the wood in the oven at 220 degrees. Leslie's family is extremely supportive of her art and doesn't mind that there is usually wood in the oven! Dry wood is then shaped roughly round so that it can fit in a mold.

Leslie then puts the dry wood in a mold or container and adds resin. To color the resin she uses predominantly mica powders. She uses a urethane resin that has NO tolerance for moisture. So she places the wood and liquid resin in a pressure pot at approximately 40 psi for two hours. It keeps moisture out, applies pressure to eliminate bubbles, and it hardens quickly.

Then for the fun part! And the messy part! Leslie turns the pieces on a lathe. The pieces frequently dictate the shape as Leslie discovers what is underneath. And safety first! Leslie wears a face mask, face shield and uses a dust collection system. The final project is then sanded, polished, and buffed.

TURN A BOWL

Our first Club Challenge of 2024! Turn a bowl, but not just any bowl. Winner will receive a \$50 Woodcraft Gift Card. The prize-winning bowl will be chosen by an impartial judging panel. REMEMBER YOUR ENTRY IS DUE ON MARCH 20TH.

Here IS A REVIEW OF THE criteria:

- Your bowl entry can be turned from the wood/s or materials of your choice
- Your bowl must be 5 ½" wide from outer rim to outer rim
- Your bowl must be 3" tall
- The wall thickness of your bowl must be consistent and no more than 1/4"
- Your bowl can be embellished in any way you like or not embellished at all
- Your bowl must be finished to perfection and have a food grade finish
- Your bowl must not be signed
- You can have more than one entry
- Bring your bowl/s to the March 20th Club meeting in a brown paper bag

The winning bowl will be retained by the Club to be auctioned at the Holiday Party. We are investigating if all other entries will be donated to the Empty Bowls project.

Challenging, yet achievable projects are on the menu. The goal is for each participant to learn. For our March 20 HOT class, Arnie Moore will be leading us to turn a Staved Lidded Box. It will be walnut and curly maple with veneers between the staves. We expect to complete the project in the one day before the monthly meeting.



First February HOT Class

Our second February 2024 HOT class was led by Steve Cook on February 21st. The topic was Pepper grinder and a saltshaker, sans holes. (Unique). Followed by an excellent demonstration provided by Steve.





Our March 2024 HOT 1 class was led by Harvey Meyer on March 6. The topic was Katie's Challenge. Harvey demonstrated techniques for determining the wall thickness of the bowls and obtaining a consistent thickness. We had a full class with a range of experience from very experienced to first time turners. A thank you to all the turners who showed up to help. We hope to see some of the bowls entered in Kaitie's challenge at the March AWG meeting.



The second monthly Hands-On-Turning (HOT) is held on the third Thursday of each month, which is also our meeting night. For the next several months we are pleased to have the demonstrator for the meeting conducting these HOT classes. You can sign up for these classes by sending me an email. The following is a brief description. I will send more details for these in subsequent emails, but you might want to sign up early as they will likely fill up.

The cost for these special sessions will be \$50.00 each.

April 17, 2024 - Nick Cook nickcookwoodturner.com.

Nick Cook will be teaching us how to make lidded boxes. Nick is a legend in the world of woodturning. You should not pass up the chance spend time with Nick. We still have some spaces available.

Nick Cook is a full time production turner producing a wide variety of gift items, one of a kind bowls & vessels as well as work for furniture makers and millwork contractors. He spends much of his time teaching both individuals and groups throughout the country. He has done workshops for woodturning groups in Australia and has also participated in the national woodturning symposiums in New Zealand. He is a founding member of the American Association of Woodturners and has served as vice president and conference coordinator. Nick was named the twelfth honorary lifetime member of the AAW. He has written numerous articles for various woodturning publications including *American Woodturner, Woodworkers Journal and American Woodworker.* He also has produced two videos: "Turning for Food" & "Turning for Fun and Profit.

Nick started woodworking in his father's shop when he very young. In 1988, he quit his real job and started turning for a living. He has now been in the same shop for more than 30 years. As a production turner, he produces furniture and architectural elements along with a wide variety of gift items.

May15, 2024 - Alan Leland <u>alanleland.com</u>

Alan literally wrote the book on wood turning instruction. Alan will be showing us how to turn a sphere, the instruction should be first rate. You can sign up any time by emailing me. Here is some more information on Allan from his web site.

Alan Leland is an internationally recognized woodturning instructor and demonstrator. He has won accolades from his students and his fellow woodturners for his exceptional handouts, his ability to teach and explain the various skills and techniques required to truly enjoy woodturning and most importantly his patient and thorough teaching style. The six plus session woodturning curriculum with its' companion woodturning lab manual, which was developed to compliment his weeklong turning classes at the John C. Campbell Folk School, has garnered high praise. His work is primarily functional in nature due to his furniture background, but with an artistic flair due to his keen eye for shape and form. He has demonstrated at many national and regional woodturning symposia and done demonstrations and workshops for many woodturning clubs across the U.S. and Canada.

June 19, 2024. Sammy Long sammylong.com

Sammy will be instructing us on creative relief carving. This should be a great class, here is some more details on Sammy.

Sammy Long is a native of Greenville, Mississippi and a resident of Brandon, Mississippi. He is happily retired from many years of work in the gas pipeline industry. He began his career as a machinist and first learned to turn on a metal lathe as a young adult.

Sammy has been an avid student of the art for the past 16 years. When he returns from a class, symposium, or demonstration, he continues to study and practice what he has learned. Whether the demonstrator is a well-known artist or a local craftsman, Sammy is open to exploring new ideas or techniques. He comes back excited and enthusiastic about the next project. Once he has practiced what he has learned, he is always eager to share with his fellow turners. Those who have directly influenced Sammy's work have been John Jordon, Binh Pho and Dixie Biggs.


Here are the details of the name badges:

- Material: 1/8" thick maple plywood which is finished with a furniture-grade semi-gloss finish.
- > Size: 3-1/2" x 2".
- > Engraving: Laser cut and engraved.
- > The cost for each badge is just \$10.00 in cash. To make the process as smooth as possible, you have two convenient options to order your badge:
